A Word from the Pastor

We are back at work. Life has returned to normal. Lights that adorned houses in my neighborhood since Halloween are now extinguished. Christmas music has gone silent. Stores are advertising Valentine's Day. And it's only the sixth day of Christmas. It feels like it all went so fast, a brief flash of silent light and then business as usual.

Without candles and the singing, it's a bit more difficult to open ourselves to the miraculous, indwelling of Christ, Emmanuel, God-with-us. It feels like ordinary life, which, of course, is what Jesus came to: Life. It is not our Christmas card picture of life, but real, every-day regular life. It is not even a comfortable life but the life of a homeless refugee family.

Here's the real miracle of Christmas: In and through the Christ Child, God is besides us and within us and for us all the time. Remember John the Gospel writer's Christmas message for us:

What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people.

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. - John 1:4-5

In receiving this life and light, Johns says that we have received grace upon grace.

Thank you for the ways you have channeled this grace, one with another, in our holy days and holidays and ordinary, challenging days. Whatever our resolutions, and whatever this year brings, live in the joy that God is with us. This grace is sufficient, it is enough. Now we can get on with the living of these days, feeding the hungry, sharing peace with the troubled, welcoming the stranger — or whatever else those who are least among us may from time to time require.

I am thankful for this moment. I will use it as an Advent exercise. "Come, Lord Jesus," I will pray. Then in the hushed reverence, I will listen, for a full minute.

A Vicar's Voice

We have a yearly tradition in my family on New Year's Day of choosing ONE WORD. On January 1st we gather around the table with markers and magnetic sheet. 

Year-end Checkin On Your Contributions to Zion

During December, take a moment to check your online giving record to be sure it reflects your donations to Zion to date.

It's a simple process. First, login to the online directory. If you already have registered, simply login and then from the main screen, click on Giving History. The first screen will show your giving history to date (from the launch of the Servant Keeper software in 2018). Click on Detail (just under the black bar at the top) and you'll see your 2019 contributions. You can click on the date range as well and select a different time frame. Contributions are posted to the system after the weekly count amount is verified from the bank, so recent contributions may take a few days to post. If you see any errors or discrepancies, please notify the church office.

If you have not yet registered, to enable secure access, follow these steps:

- 1. Go to servantkeeper.com/member-portal/zelc/login
- 2. Click on the link that says "Haven't registered yet?"
- 3. Add your family email address. In the Servant Keeper system, that is ordinarily the email associated with the head of household. If you put in an email address and receive no confirmation with a few minutes, try another family email address. For example, if you first put in one spouse's email address, on the second try, use the email of the other spouse. If you still have problems, that is, you don't receive a confirmation email with a password reset in it, please call the church office so we can check to see which email is listed as primary.
- 4. You'll receive an email titled "Member Portal Registration" and in it a link to create a password and login.
- 5. Once you create that, you can log into the directory online. You will go to your entry directly and you can use the links to view your family profile, edit member information, and view your contribution history.

Notice, too, on the bottom of your profile page that there's a link to the entire online directory. Until people get photos uploaded, it looks pretty empty but if you click on the names, you'll get address, phone, and email detail. The password to link to the directory, once you are logged into Servant Keeper, is zionfoothill.

Giving to Zion

Generous contributions from members and friends of Zion help us carry out our operations and goals each year. Key points: We ask for a statement of intent each year (we are receiving these on December 8). These financial commitments help the church council set and keep to the budget for the year.

How you can give offerings to Zion:

- 1) Cash or checks in the offering plate. You set the frequency, from weekly to annually. If you want to use envelopes, contact the church office for a box for the year.
- 2) Online bill pay, via your financial institution. Set up regular contributions in your bill pay system, to be sent to Zion. There typically are no charges or fees for either you or the church.
- 3) Vanco or PayPal: These online systems are easy to set up and convenient to use for either one-time gifts or ongoing donations. See the instructions on Zion's web page: http://www.zelc.org/give-now.html . Though they are simple, do be aware that both of these services charge fees to Zion of about 2% of your donation. If you do choose to use them, please consider adding a little extra to offset those fees. When you sign up, you will see an option to add extra to offset ACH and/or credit card processing fees so 100% of your donation can be used for mission and ministry.
- 4) The Advantages of a Tax-Free Transfer from an IRA to Zion: If you are 70 1/2 and need to start taking Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) each year from your traditional IRA, you can request that a distribution be sent directly to Zion. This transfer, called a qualified charitable distribution, reduces your adjusted gross income by the amount of the transfer so may help you stay in a lower tax bracket, avoid increased Medicare premiums, etc. Instead of giving weekly donations, an annual check is generated by your IRA custodian to Zion. Talk to your IRA provider today to see if this method could be beneficial for your financial planning in 2020. There is additional information available online; one source is the Fidelity Investments page: fidelity.com/build-ing-savings/learn-about-iras/required-minimum-distributions/qcds.
- 5) Time and talents: There are numerous opportunities for service in and around Zion, which you can do in addition to your financial contributions. There are ongoing volunteer opportunities for counting offerings, altar guild, assisting minister service, Sunday School teaching and attendance, and choir, among others. There also are one-time events to keep in mind, like helping set up the sanctuary Christmas tree, hosting the annual holiday wine and cheese event, coffee hour sponsorship, help with VBS and other children-related events, like the Christmas program, and more. They will be noted in the bulletin and Herald, so watch for them!
